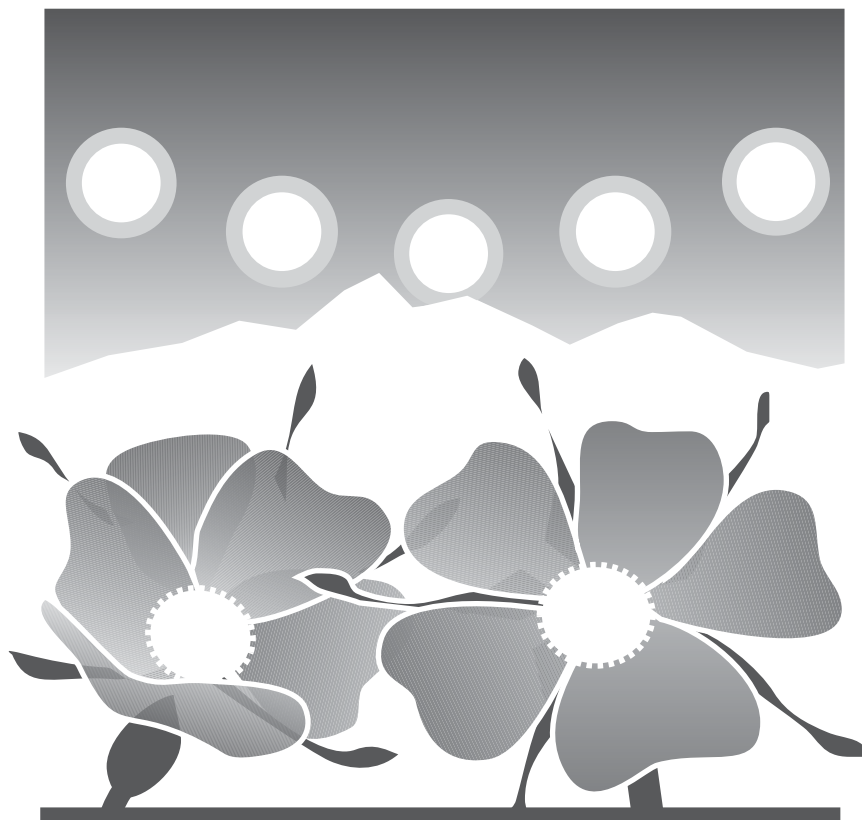

Introduction

Each year approximately 300 annual flowering plants are included in the tests at the Georgeson Botanical Garden. The current year performance is reported in Tables 3 and 4. Cultivars are tested for three years, not necessarily consecutively. Final three-year average performance is outlined in Table 5.

The annual flower trials were planted from 29 May through 6 June, 2002 in the Perennial Landscape and All American Selections Display Garden of the Georgeson Botanical Garden (64° 51'N, 147° 52'W). Fairbanks silt loam soil was fertilized with 10-20-20S (4 lbs per 100 sq. ft., 195 g per sq meter) on 29 May. Flowers were grown as seedling transplants and were hardened off outdoors for one week prior to transplanting.

All cultivars were planted according to recommended commercial spacing guide lines in unreplanted beds. Plant numbers varied according to plot size. The granular herbicide Preen® (Trifluralin), was applied on 10 June to all plots. Plots were irrigated as needed throughout the summer. A fungicide treatment (Topsin M®), Thiophanate-methyl) was applied on 21 June and 16 July to inhibit the growth of *Sclerotinia* cottony rot.

Plot evaluations began immediately after planting and continued weekly through September. They consisted of flowering dates and occurrence of disease, insect pests, seed pods, off-type plants, and other deformities. From 25 July to 31 Aug., each cultivar was measured for plant height and flower size, rated for

performance of flowers and foliage, and evaluated for fragrance and potential use as cut flowers or in dried arrangements. Frost tolerance was noted one week after the first frost on 13 September.

Weather data were compiled annually from a U.S. Weather Service station, elevation 475ft (145m), located approximately 350ft (107m) west of the Garden. The last spring frost was 24 May (31°F, -0.6°C). (Table 1). Thaw degree day accumulation was below the previous ten-year average of 3318.9 degree days. The frost free season was two days longer than the previous ten year average.

The weather statistics describe a fairly typical growing season for Fairbanks. All plants grew well, and there were no surprise mid summer frosts. This season did not follow the pattern of the past two seasons where frost did not kill the garden until the end of September. Frost brought the growing season to an abrupt end in mid September. An unusual aspect of this season was the severity of the first frost. Typically, temperatures will drop one to three degrees below freezing, but the 2003 season showed a precipitous drop to 23.1°F (-5.0°C). Many plants that normally tolerate frost, were killed by the severity of the first killing frost. Even many pansies and violas, plants grown specifically for their frost tolerance, showed some damage. This year has allowed us to distinguish among annual flowers that can tolerate deep frost and those sensitive to all but light frosts. This distinction is noted in the comments for individual flowers.

Georgeson Botanical Garden Map- 2003

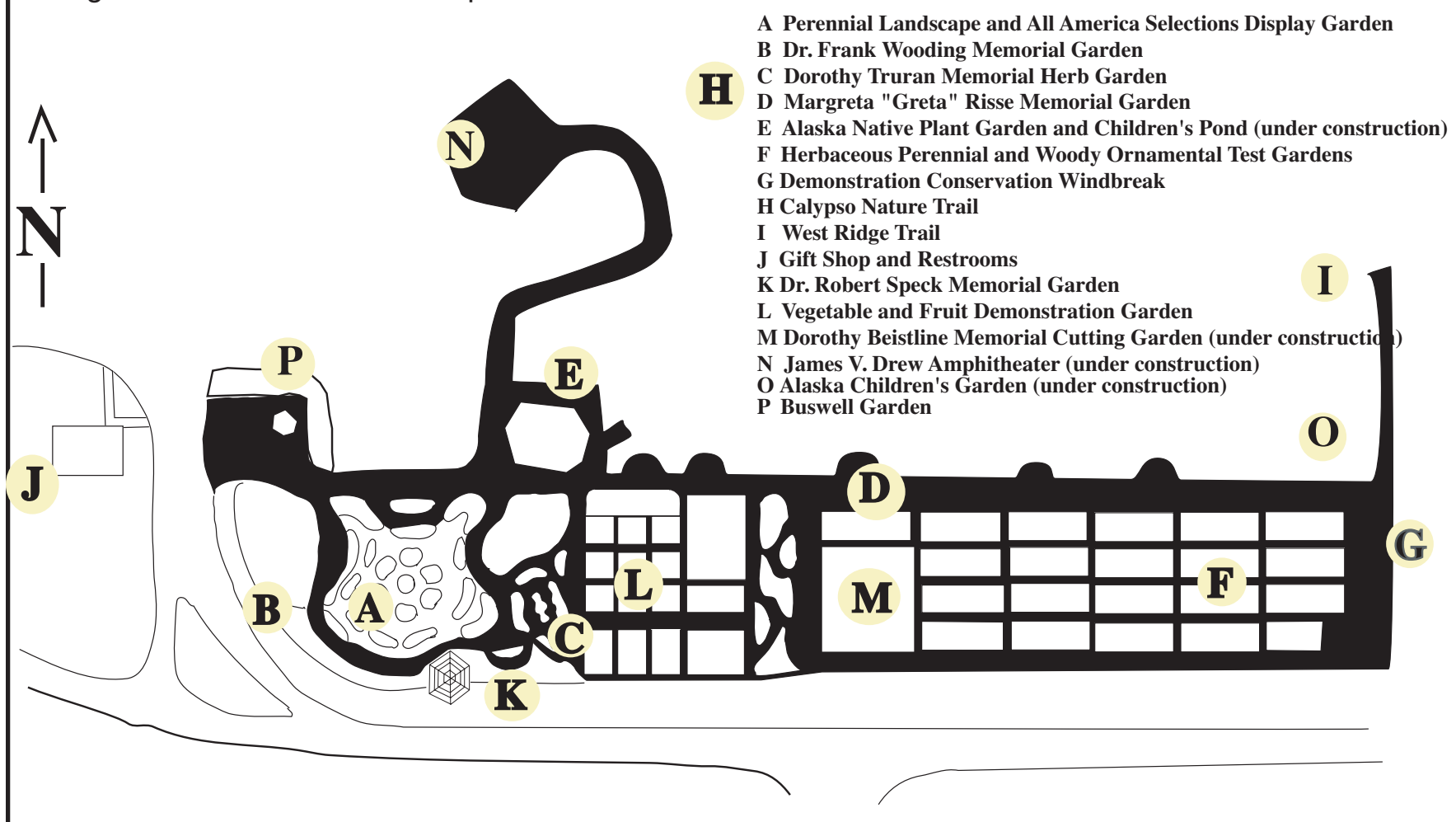
